



Poverty statistics in Niagara

Over 14% of Niagara residents live in poverty.

1 in 7 children in Niagara live in poverty.

1 in every 5 rental households pays more than 50% of their income on shelter costs.

Over 4,900 households are on the wait list for affordable housing.

Wait time is up to 18 years for a family to obtain an affordable home through Niagara Regional Housing.

Negative impact of poor housing

Children have a greater likelihood of poor health.

Stress and poor nutrition often result in chronic health issues.

Parents work long hours, often 2 or 3 jobs, leaving little time with their children, help with school or participate in community activities.


Teens often work several jobs to help, with poor school attendance and performance often as a result.

Frequent moves to find affordable rent means children must change schools causing further stress.



How we work


We partner with families from application through construction, extending to after the keys have been handed over.



- **build:** Families selected for Habitat homeownership help build their homes assisted by volunteers and community support.
- buy: Habitat homeowners pay an affordable mortgage geared to their income.
- reinvest: Mortgage payments are invested into a revolving fund, referred to as the Fund for Humanity, which is used by the local Habitat to build more homes for families in their community.

Impact on homeowners

The Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation conducted a Canada-wide survey of Habitat families in 2013. The majority reported improved health, happiness and overall wellbeing.



Our Plans

In 2023 Habitat will be building 5 homes in Thorold on Mary & Taylor Streets, with construction well underway.

This is just part of our 5-year plan to construct 30 homes in Niagara.
