12.1 DS 47-2024

Residential Rental Licensing Financial Data

Moved by: Councillor Dekker Seconded by: Councillor Sentance

That Report DS 47-2024, dated November 12, 2024, respecting Residential Rental Licensing Financial Data, **BE RECEIVED**, and the following recommendations **BE APPROVED**:

- 1. That Council **DIRECT** staff to prepare amendments to the Residential Rental Licensing By-law that establish:
 - provisions specific to short-term rental and Bed and Breakfast establishments,

- a demerit point system for residential rental licences,
- an administrative fee for non-appearance to scheduled inspections, and
- a prohibition of advertising a rental unit without a valid Residential Rental Licence,

for Council's consideration at a future meeting.

- That Council **DIRECT** staff to review the licence application fee for ability to fund expenses associated with enforcement of the Residential Rental Licensing By-law and report back with recommendations:
- 3. That Council **APPROVE** the creation of one additional By-law Enforcement Clerk position effective January 2, 2025;
- 4. That Council APPROVE a <u>PRE-BUDGET APPROVAL</u> for an operating budget increase of \$85,000 to cover the costs of the additional By-law Enforcement Clerk and a capital budget increase of \$5,000 to cover the purchase of computer and office equipment and supplies for the By-law Enforcement Clerk, funded by residential rental licensing fees and penalties;
- 5. That Council **APPROVE** the creation of one additional Fire Prevention Officer position effective January 2, 2025;
- 6. That Council APPROVE a <u>PRE-BUDGET APPROVAL</u> for an operating budget increase of \$145,000 to cover the costs of the additional Fire prevention Officer and a capital budget increase of \$80,000 to purchase a vehicle, computer equipment, radio and related equipment for the Fire prevention Officer, funded by residential rental licensing fees and penalties;
- 7. That Council **APPROVE** an operating budget overrun of \$10,000 to the By-law Enforcement Division's portion of the 2024 operating budget, funded by residential rental licensing application fees and penalties, to accommodate temporary administrative support within the By-law Enforcement Division for the remainder of the 2024 calendar year;

- That Council **DIRECT** staff to research how boarding, lodging or rooming houses contribute to the housing supply within Thorold and report back to Council with the findings and any recommendations; and
- That funding for the existing Fire Prevention Officer BE TRANSFERRED from RRL to levy for 2025 for a budget levy impact of \$52,000.

- 1. That Council **APPROVE** the Energy Conservation and Demand Management Plan (2024-2029) and publish the document in accordance with Regulation 25/23 of the *Electricity Act, 1998;* and
- 2. That Council **APPROVE** funding for the study in the amount of \$8,100 (plus HST), from the Municipal Land and Building Reserve; and
- 3. That staff **BE DIRECTED** to include the proposed recommendations in the 10-year Capital Forecast.

- That a budget reallocation of \$68,959.70 from the Pine/Sullivan Intersection Road Bump Outs budget BE APPROVED to fund the 2024 Traffic Calming Project, including speed humps at the identified locations within the City; and
- 3. That the Mayor and City Clerk **BE AUTHORIZED** to execute the necessary agreements/contracts.

14. Motions

14.1 Physician Recruitment Program

Moved by: Councillor Dekker Seconded by: Councillor De Divitiis

WHEREAS the state of health care in Ontario is in crisis, with 2.3 million Ontarians lacking access to a family doctor, emergency room closures across the province, patients being de-rostered and 40% of family doctors considering retirement over the next five years;

WHEREAS the percentage of family physicians practicing comprehensive family medicine has declined from 77 in 2008 to 65 percent in 2022;

WHEREAS the City of Thorold is underserved by approximately seven (7) family physicians; and

WHEREAS Ontario municipal governments play an integral role in the health care system through responsibilities in public health, long-term care, paramedicine, and other investments;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Corporation of the City of Thorold enacts as follows:

- 1. That Council for the City of Thorold **DIRECTS** staff to prepare a report respecting a physician recruitment program targeting the recruitment of four (4) family physicians to practice in the City of Thorold; and
- 2. That the proposed physician recruitment program and report **BE CONSIDERED** during the 2025 Budget Process.

14.2 City Council Statement respecting Flag Desecration

Moved by: Councillor DeRose Seconded by: Councillor De Divitiis

WHEREAS the Canadian flag is a symbol of the nation's unity, history, and values, representing the sacrifices and contributions made by Canadians across generations;

WHEREAS the Canadian flag stands as a symbol of national pride, democracy, freedom, and the rights and responsibilities of Canadian citizens;

WHEREAS the desecration of the Canadian flag is an act that disrespects the ideals and principles upon which Canada was built, undermining national cohesion and respect for the country's institutions;

WHEREAS acts of flag desecration can cause significant emotional harm to Canadians, particularly veterans, and others for whom the flag represents personal or collective sacrifice, dignity, and identity; and

WHEREAS criminalizing the desecration of the Canadian flag would serve as a means of protecting national symbols from acts that seek to degrade their meaning while still respecting the constitutional rights of citizens to protest peacefully and express diverse views; NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Corporation of the City of Thorold enacts as follows:

- 1. That Council for the City of Thorold **SUPPORTS** the amendment to the *Criminal Code* R.S.C., 1985, c. C-46, for the purpose of criminalizing the act of desecrating the Canadian Flag; and
- 2. That this resolution **BE CIRCULATED** to the Office of the Prime Minister of Canada, Justin Trudeau, and the Office of Member of Parliament for Niagara Centre, Vance Badawey.

The following friendly amendment was accepted by the Mayor, and mover and seconder of the motion:

That the Motion **BE AMENDED** to read as follows:

- 1. That Council for the City of Thorold **SUPPORTS** the amendment to the *Criminal Code* R.S.C., 1985, c. C-46, for the purpose of criminalizing the act of desecrating the Canadian Flag; and
- 2. That this resolution BE CIRCULATED to the Office of the Prime Minister of Canada, Justin Trudeau, and the Office of Member of Parliament for Niagara Centre, Vance Badawey, the Regional Municipality of Niagara, and lower-tier municipalities within the Region of Niagara.

The Mayor called a vote on the motion, as amended, and declared it

14.3 Feeding of Wildlife

Moved by: Councillor O'Hare Seconded by: Councillor Sentance

WHEREAS, as human development continues to encroach upon natural wildlife habitats, the likelihood increases that animals will venture into residential areas in search of food and shelter;

WHEREAS, the act of feeding wildlife in residential areas encourages animals to become more habituated to human presence, potentially leading to increased risks of aggression and dangerous interactions with people;

WHEREAS, the feeding of wildlife can contribute to the growth of rodent populations, creating further health and safety concerns within communities;

WHEREAS, providing food to wildlife often results in improper diets, leading to malnutrition, illness, and the spread of diseases among animals that may subsequently affect local ecosystems; and

WHEREAS, wildlife that frequent residential areas in search of food can cause significant damage to homes, gardens, and property, creating costly repairs and safety hazards for residents;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Corporation of the City of Thorold enacts as follows:

That Staff **BE DIRECTED** report back to Council respecting options to prohibit the feeding of wildlife within the City of Thorold, through the passage of a by-law, or amendment to a pre-existing by-law.
